National Museum of Crime & Punishment Welcomes Residents this Winter with “Six Dollar Sundays” Locals-Only Discount

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Local residents who’ve been hiding from this blustery winter now have a reason to leave their warm homes. Starting January 10th, the **National Museum of Crime & Punishment (NMCP)** is beginning their “Six Dollar Sundays”, a thank-you tribute to those who call D.C. home. From January 10th through March 14th, all local residents with proper ID will receive \$6 admission to the museum anytime on Sundays.

“During the summer, Washington is overwhelmed with tourists trying to see all the city’s offerings in a short period of time. Now that the dust has settled and the city is relatively quiet, we want to invite residents to experience our museum, whether it is their first visit or their fiftieth,” said Janine Vaccarello, Chief Operating Officer of the National Museum of Crime & Punishment.

The discounted admission price offers guests access to interact with a realistic forensics lab, create ID cards and fingerprinting, and use a lie detector test. Visitors to the museum will also experience first-hand the skills necessary to fight crime through such interactive components as a simulated FBI shooting range and high-speed police chase simulators. Artifacts include J. Edgar Hoover’s badge and boxing gloves given to him by James Braddock (“Cinderella Man),” John Dillinger’s car, the 1967 Hollywood film “Death Car” of Bonnie and Clyde, and the collections of Poncho Villa and Jesse James.
