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**DISCOVERY HEALTH'S DR. G AMONG THE NATIONAL MUSEUM OF
CRIME & PUNISHMENT ADVISORY BOARD**

National Museum of Crime & Punishment continues with the museum's educational experience as it announces board members such as Dr. Jan Garavaglia, star of Discovery Health's Dr. G: Medical Examiner.

Washington, D.C. – Positioned as *the* museum to attend to learn about crime, consequences of crime, and law enforcement in America, the National Museum of Crime & Punishment has lined up an extensive advisory board whose breadth of knowledge encompasses aspects of crime and punishment in America.

In addition to John Walsh and *America's Most Wanted*, bringing in experts from chief medical examiners to wardens, and cops to criminal investigators, the National Museum of Crime & Punishment advisory board members will enhance the credibility of the museum designed to educate, entertain, and inspire.

Former police officer, attorney and Florida Circuit Court **Judge Alex E. Ferrer** currently serves as the host of TV show "Judge Alex," the highly rated court room show on the air. Prior to his television debut, Judge Alex served as the Associate Administrative Judge of the Criminal Division of Florida's Eleventh Judicial Circuit, which services Miami-Dade County, the largest trial court in the state and fourth largest in the United States. At 19 he joined the Coral Gables Police Department, and served as a patrolman, detective and in an undercover capacity. He was also trained to be on the department's SWAT force. Judge Alex is a current member of the Florida and District of Columbia Bars, and has served as an adjunct professor at Florida International University, teaching graduate courses in criminal law and procedure.

Dr. Jan C. Garavaglia, aka Dr. G teaches viewers of Discovery Health all about her job as a chief medical examiner for the District Nine (Orange-Osceola) Medical Examiner's Office in Florida on the popular series, *Dr. G: Medical Examiner*. Stepping from behind the camera, Garavaglia brings to the table her expertise in the crime solving gallery of the museum, teaching the science behind understanding wounds and discovering how exactly a person died. Certification and awards include: American Board of Pathology in anatomic, clinical, and forensic pathology; member of the National Association of Medical Examiners and American Academy of Forensic Sciences; and is the recipient of the Hidalgo Award. Garavaglia has been published in media such as the Journal of Forensic Sciences and The American Journal of Forensic Medicine and Pathology.

Criminal investigator and analyst, **Joseph P. Matthews** might look familiar from his interviews on TV regarding high-profile cases such as the Lori Hacking homicide investigation, O.J. Simpson's memorabilia robbery, and the death investigation of Anna Nicole Smith and her son Daniel. Mr. Matthews shares his knowledge on how to gather clues to find out the mystery behind crime using forensic science and DNA. Also to his credit, Mr. Matthews founded DNA LifePrint, Inc., a personally developed and marketed state-of-the-art, scientifically validated home DNA identification and legacy kit.

As a U.S. Marshal, a position achievable only through Presidential appointment with the advice and consent of the U.S. Senate, **Johnny L. Hughes** effectively directs the activities for the districts in the state of Maryland. Among his many duties as a U.S. Marshal, Hughes is responsible for leading fugitive task forces, operating the Witness Security Program, and seizing property acquired by criminals through illegal activities. Prior to his appointment in 2002, Hughes was Director of High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area Information Office. He also worked for the Maryland State Police from 1967 to 1996. He was awarded the United States Attorney General's Special Commendation Award in 1993 and National Law Enforcement Council Achievement Award in 1992.

Knowing the ins and outs of the U.S. punitive system, **Jolene Constance** is the Assistant Warden at the C. Paul Phelps Correctional Center. Ms. Constance serves as a member of the American Correctional Association, North American Association of Wardens & Superintendents, and Southern States Correctional Association. Her knowledge in the field has allowed her to complete the National Center for Construction Education and Research Leadership Academy as well as become a Master Trainer for the National Center for Construction and Education Research.

Joe Rosboschil is retired from the Alexandria Police Department as a Captain with nearly 20 years of service. He spent five years as the Deputy Chief of Police with the Supreme Court of the United States Police, and currently serves as the Director of Protection Services for the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum. Rosboschil has also served on the Administration of Justice faculty of the Northern Virginia Community College for over 15 years.

Serving for almost four decades in all three of Leavenworth, Kansas' famous penitentiaries, **Kenneth M. LaMaster** is a specialist in custody facilities, and author of the book *U.S. Penitentiary Leavenworth*. He also is trained in crime scene photography, evidence preservation, and weapons, among others. A career as a Correctional Officer, Materials Handler Foreman, and Institution Historian, Kenneth M. LaMaster's will bring valuable expertise to NMCP's Advisory Board.

Dennis Sobin spent 10 years in prison after he refused to plead guilty and accept probation for a crime he did not commit. While he was incarcerated, he spent his time working on art, learning to read music and play classical guitar. Upon his exit from prison in 2003, Dennis formed the Prisons Foundation with two other wrongly incarcerated individuals, Helen Thorne and Jim Pruitt. Funding was received from Lloyd Rubin, an international entrepreneur, art collector, and former prisoner. The Prisons Foundation now operates the Prison Art Gallery in downtown Washington, DC and produces prisoner-oriented musicals and dramas at the Kennedy Center.

Sandy Jones, an avid collector of 1930s outlaw memorabilia, serves as a historical expert on the museum's board. As a researcher & historian for over 40 years, Mr. Jones has compiled quite an extensive data base on the subject. Owner of the *John Dillinger Historical Society and Outlaw Museum*, Jones has lent such artifacts as John Dillinger's car, handwritten poems by Bonnie Parker, and artwork by Machine Gun Kelly to be displayed at the National Museum of Crime & Punishment.

NMCP is proud to have the Honorable **Alfonso E. Lenhardt** on its advisory board, as he looks to bring his wealth of knowledge and experience to the table as the president and CEO of the National Crime Prevention Council. Along with becoming the first African American to serve as an officer in Congress, Lenhardt was also senior vice president for Government Relations for the Shaw Group, Inc. In addition, he served as the executive vice president and chief operating officer of the Council on Foundations. Retiring from the U.S. Army in 1997 after 31 years, Lenhardt held the positions of Major General, Commanding General and U.S. Army Recruiting Commander.

Bud Gaylord is Director of the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children's (NCMEC) Case Analysis and Support Division. Bud joined NCMEC in 1996. He is responsible for the Case Analysis Unit which analyzes missing and abducted children cases, the Special Analysis Unit that consists of research analysts, attempted abduction analysts and the newly created Sex Offender Tracking Team that is working with law enforcement agencies to locate non-complaint registered sex offenders. He also supervises the Background Check Unit that conducts fingerprint criminal history checks for potential volunteers to youth serving nonprofit organizations. Gaylord also oversees the Center's access to the FBI's National Crime Information Center, the Virginia State Police Virginia Crime Information Network and to Nlets, The International Justice and Public Safety Network. He is also the liaison for the Center's access to the FBI's Law Enforcement Online system and the national Regional Information Sharing System Network.

A specialist in counter terrorism and law enforcement, **Derwin J. Bradley**, a former military bodyguard has provided advanced tactical police training to U.S. Army Special Forces, British Army Special Forces, and Police SWAT Teams. With his extensive involvement in law enforcement and training, Bradley adds depth to the Advisory Board and meaning to the law enforcement galleries in the museum. Bradley is also the author of two books, "Black and Blue: Understanding Modern Law Enforcement in your America" and "The Operator Fear No Evil."

Moses S. Schanfield, Ph.D. currently works as a Professor of Forensic Science at George Washington University. He previously directed the regional crime laboratory in Rochester, New York and a ground breaking private forensic genetic laboratory in Denver, CO called Analytical Genetic Testing Center. Professor Schanfield has published over 140 articles in forensic science and other areas.

An expert on violent and political crime, **Jeffrey Ian Ross, Ph.D.** is an Associate Professor in the Division of Criminology, Criminal Justice and Social Policy, and a Fellow of the Center for International and Comparative Law at the University of Baltimore. Having researched, written, and lectured on national security, political violence, political crime, violent crime, corrections, and policing for over two decades, Dr. Ross adds extensive insight to the NMCP Advisory Board and museum goers.

As President, CEO, and Chairman of the Board for Leland Enterprises Inc., **Ken G. Dixon** brings the financial and accounting authority to the Advisory Board of NMCP. With degrees in management and accounting, and decades of experience in finance, Dixon brings an understanding of business to the museum.
